




UHCC Native Hawaiian enrollment 28.5% 68% of all Native Hawaiians in UH System are enrolled at the CCs




Recent high school graduates entering fall semester following their spring graduation from high school



Students from Underserved Regions






Degrees Awarded in STEM at UHM, UHH, UHWO, & UHMC to Former CC Students




\$ values increased from \$8,288,315 in 2006 to \$37,494,393 in 2011






All Students Transfers to Non-UH




Native Hawaiian Transfers to Non-UH


AtD Cohort Full-Time in Fall who complete 20 Credits in first year with GPA at least 2.0


AtD Cohort Full-Time in Fall who complete 20 Credits in first year with GPA at least 2.0

Part-Time


AtD Cohort Part-Time in Fall who complete 12 Credits in first year with GPA at least 2.0





UHCC Initiative

Part-Time Initiative

- Part-time learners face barriers classified as attitudinal, institutional, or situational.
- Longer it takes to earn degree or transfer to a 4-year institution, lessens likelihood that a student will achieve success.
- Part-time students enrolled in 6-8 credits per semester are a concern.
- UHCC Part-Time Student Committee's charge is to help the UHCC better understand needs, obstacles, and opportunities for success.



At its January 2013 meeting, ACCJC considered the colleges' Institutional Self Evaluation Report and Report of the External Evaluation Team that visited six CCs during October 15-18, 2012. The Commission reaffirmed accreditation with an October 15th follow up report and visit for five colleges. The sixth college was placed on warning with a follow up report and visit.
